- SYMPOSIUM BUDAPEST

Welcome to Budapest!

As you know, IADA is organizing an interim symposium in Budapest on adhesives and their problems in paper conservation at the end of May 2005. The symposium will be held at the National Széchényi Library, the National Library of Hungary, and will be coorganized by the Conservators' Section of the Technical Association of Paper- and Printing-Industry in Hungary (PNyME). This association was established in 1948, and until 1980 had two sections: one for the professionals from the paper industry and one for the printing industry. At the end of

the 1970s, bookbinders and paper/book conservators, who worked in libraries, archives and museums decided to establish a professional organization. PNyME – whose activity has been in close relation with paper and books – accepted them as members of their association and from 1980 on the (book and paper) conservators section is the third working group within the association. Since then, our section has been very active in maintaining the professional con-

tacts and providing possibilities for continuing training, e.g. lectures and reports at the regular meetings of the members, special courses, publications, visits, study tours at home and abroad, professional language course etc. The section currently has a membership of about 120-140.

I am sure this is familiar for those of you who were participants at the international conference on book and paper conservation hosted by the National Széchényi Library and organized by the Conservators' Section of PNyME in 1990. For you it would not be necessary to introduce Budapest and the venues of the library and you may still have nice memories about the sessions and the visits to conservation workshops as well as the social events and the excursions made in Hungary. In this case we can only hope that, after fifteen years, you wish to return and that you look forward to it.

Since then, there have been many book and paper conservators from Europe, who wanted to see the conservation activity pursued at both the National Library and the National Archives as well as at other institutions in Budapest and in the country. Through visits or study opportunities in Hungary, and the widening possibilities for Hungarian conservators, we have significantly developed our connections with many European colleagues and international professional organizations and institutions.

For those of you, who have never been in Budapest (Buda and Pest) this is the very

best occasion to see one of the most beautiful cities of Europe (or the world?), lying on the banks of the river Duna! The city makes an impression on visitors mainly through its situation on the river and among the hills (the panorama of the Castle hill and the Pest bank from the river is a UNESCO World Heritage site) and the amazingly varied 19th century architecture with the special 'Hungarian Art Nouveau' buildings in it. One of the finest neoclassic buildings is that of the National Museum on the Pest side of the river which used to be the home of the National Library from the 19th century until 1985 when the Library moved to Buda Castle hill. This site was where the monarchs of Hungary established their palace in the 14th century and the magnificent renaissance library (Bibliotheca Corviniana) in the second half of the 15th century. Now the National Library, the National

Gallery and the Museum of the History of Budapest can be found in the reconstructed buildings of the 19th century palace originally built for the palatine (regent) in the Austro-Hungarian Monarchy. You will also find the impressive neo-roman building of the Hungarian National Archives on the castle hill (but at the other end of it). Walking between the National Library and the National Archives you can enjoy the historical atmosphere of the ancient Buda with the small, coloured, dwelling houses of mainly baroque style in the narrow streets. Some of these houses keep some Gothic architectural remains in their gateways or courtyards.

The National Library is an ideal venue for a small conference. The friendly and technically well-equipped large hall contains some 150 seats and the interpretors boxes may also be accomodated here. You will be able to see the smaller exhibitions of the six special collections of the library, and a larger exhibition where you will always find interesting items on display. On the uppermost floor of the building there is another hall with a long balcony from where you

can enjoy a breathtaking panorama of the Buda hills around. This is the right place for the reception on the first evening! On the other evening you can choose from the many entertainments (sightseeing by night by bus or by cruising on the river, concerts, opera, ballet etc.). After the lecture days, you will be welcomed to see the conservation workshops of the National Library, the National Archives and some of the varied museums in Budapest.

In the name of the Hungarian paper and book conservators we have pleasure in inviting all interested colleagues to the IADA symposium in Budapest!
